Developmentally Appropriate Hands-On Learning is learning that deliberately targeted at the age and stage of a learner. It is interactive, kinesthetic and tactile learning. At Redwood School this way of learning is explored through our Investigation time and aspects of our InSTEAD learning. In our Junior classrooms this looks like play and develops in sophistication and complexity as we progress through the school.



Hands-on learning is the oldest and most effective learning method. Physical manipulation of equipment and tools builds neural pathways more effectively than just listening or watching something be done or explained. We know that hands-on learning better engages both sides of the brain, helping students make better connections to what they are learning. Knowledge and skills are more likely to be retained through hands-on learning. Hands-on learning engages learners and also supports a wide range of learning needs.
